





Travel time between Zhuhai and Jiangmen cut to 30 minutes

Following the opening of the Hong Kong-Zhuhai-Macao Bridge and Shenzhen-Zhongshan Link, the third cross-sea mega project in the Greater Bay Area has been officially opened to traffic. The Huangmaohai Cross-Sea Passage is a western extension of the Hong Kong-Zhuhai-Macao Bridge that connects Zhuhai and Jiangmen. The opening of the new passage means it takes just 30 minutes to travel between these two cities, while the travel time from Hong Kong to Jiangmen has been cut to just 90 minutes. (China Daily)

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Shenzhen advances infrastructure development for low-altitude economy

Shenzhen has issued a plan for new infrastructure development to support the low-altitude economy. The city has pledged to invest at least RMB12 billion in low-altitude infrastructure over the next two years. Its target is to build more than 1,200 low-altitude takeoff and landing facilities for manned flights, logistics, community deliveries and urban governance services by 2026. (Shenzhen Daily)

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New measures boost financing support for foreign traders

The Ministry of Commerce has announced a slew of measures to promote the continued growth of foreign trade in Mainland China, from increasing financial support to strengthening the new momentum for foreign trade. Under the measures, the scale and coverage of export credit insurance will be expanded and cross-border trade settlement will be improved. There will also be moves to better support cross-border e-commerce and promote the development of overseas smart logistics platforms. (Xinhua)



"Single Submission for Dual Declaration" scheme for cargo extended

The customs administrations of the mainland and Hong Kong recently launched the "Single Submission for Dual Declaration" scheme for cargo, extending the coverage of the existing scheme to cover all land boundary control points connecting the two places. The move will enable more enterprises to benefit from making a single submission of road cargo information when completing customs declarations for journeys between the mainland and Hong Kong. Enterprises benefit from simplified cross-border e-commerce procedures

The General Administration of Customs recently announced measures to optimise the export supervision of cross-border e-commerce. The measures include abolishing the registration requirement for enterprises engaged in overseas warehouse operations and simplifying the declaration procedures for export documents. In addition, the pilot for "inspection before shipment" for consolidated export shipments has been expanded to 12 directly affiliated customs offices, including Guangzhou. (Global Times)
